#### **Description of First Aid Measures**

**Inhalation:** May cause drowsiness or dizziness. Peripheral neurotoxicity has been reported in connection with over exposure to n-hexane. Prolonged exposure over a period of weeks or months to levels well above the TLV may cause neurotoxic disease, with symptoms including weakness and lack of sensation in fingers, hands, arms, feet and legs. Methyl ethyl ketone has been reported to potentiate the neurotoxic effects caused by either n-hexane or methyl-n-butyl ketone. Methyl ethyl ketone by itself does not cause a peripheral neuropathy. #### **Extinguishing Media**
